Yōkoso! Welcome to Basic Japanese, an elective offered by the Foreign Languages Division of the Department of Liberal Studies. This is a module which should provide you with the skills to understand and be understood in basic communication situations in Japanese. Please note the following guidelines regarding the module:

REGISTRATION

The first requirement for you to pursue and successfully complete this module is that it **MUST** appear on your course diet. Please check ISAS by the end of the second week of the semester to ensure that your name appears among those of students registered for the module. If you have registered and your name does not appear on the list, contact your programme director. **Students whose names do not appear on the official ISAS list will NOT be allowed to do assignments.**

ATTENDANCE

Your *Student Handbook* indicates that specific modules may make attendance compulsory. Because this is a skills-based module, attendance is required and counts toward your overall grade.

EXEMPTIONS

Exemptions are not granted for foreign language electives. If you have done a foreign language before, you must register to do another foreign language or an elective offered by the Humanities Division.

ASSESSMENT

Coursework assignments and in-class tests are the only means by which you will be assessed in this module. This means—particularly for working students—that you must pay careful attention to assignment deadlines and test dates. Missing assignment deadlines or tests without an acceptable excuse carries serious penalties. Remember that **it is your responsibility to keep informed about the dates coursework assignments are due and in-class tests are administered.**

- **Acceptable excuses for late submission of assignments/absence from tests**
 - Illness

If you fail to submit an assignment or miss a test for medical reasons, you must present a valid medical certificate. This certificate, or a copy stamped by your faculty or school, must be given to your lecturer at the first Japanese class after the leave expires. Your lecturer will submit this certificate to the Head of Foreign Languages. ***Please note that the university reserves the right to forward any medical certificate to its doctors for investigation.***

- Declared/Verifiable emergency

If you fail to submit an assignment or miss a test because of a **declared emergency** arising from a natural disaster such as a hurricane, no documentary proof of such an event is necessary. However, if the cause is a localised

emergency, a letter documenting that situation must be submitted to the head of division through your lecturer. **Please note that the excuse becomes acceptable only if the emergency is verifiable.**

- **Evaluation in the event of absence**

If your reason for being absent is acceptable, you will be required to do the assignment under test conditions at the earliest opportunity following your return to classes. The date and time for this must be agreed with your lecturer. In the event that you gave no reason for being absent or your reason was deemed unacceptable, you will receive a **zero** for the assignment in question. This means that your final grade will be calculated out of 100% based on the assignment(s) done.

RE-DO

If you fail this module, you must make plans to re-do it when next it is offered. Please note that **modules are only offered in the summer if there are enough students to make them viable.**

PLAGIARISM

Plagiarism is the act of presenting another person's ideas as your own. The University of Technology, Jamaica considers it an act of academic misconduct. You are also discouraged from using online translator. This is also an act of academic misconduct and university penalties will apply when used for assessments.

1.0 MODULE DESCRIPTION

In this module, as non-Japanese speakers you will explore the basic functions and structures of Japanese with application to the tasks and vocabulary required to communicate effectively in controlled, everyday situations. You will engage in a variety of listening, speaking, reading and writing activities. You should also develop an awareness of relevant aspects of the Japanese culture.

2.0 MODULE OBJECTIVES/LEARNING OUTCOMES

Upon completion of the module, the student should:

- 2.1 communicate with rephrasing and repair with sympathetic speakers of Japanese in basic controlled situations;
- 2.2 read and understand a variety of material in hiragana, katakana and kanji;
- 2.3 produce written texts using correct grammar and appropriate writing systems;
- 2.4 listen to Japanese texts and demonstrate understanding;
- 2.5 develop an appropriate attitude towards foreign language learning
- 2.6 foster appreciation for your own culture and that of the Japanese

3.0 LEARNING AND TEACHING APPROACHES

A functional-notional approach to language teaching and learning is employed where structural language patterns are presented and practiced in interactive and stimulating activities promoting all language skills. Students are constantly encouraged to initiate communication through questions, role-plays and dramatizations. These teaching strategies aid language internalization, increase learning motivation and situate the learning of a new language as a group experience based on personal involvement. Class and home-based activities requiring descriptive, analytic and creative interventions are undertaken.

4.0 ASSESSMENT PROCEDURES

This module will be assessed by coursework only; there will be no final examination. The objectives of the coursework is to assess student's knowledge and grasp of the content covered. The four language skills will be assessed; reading, listening, writing and speaking.
